I. MEMBERSHIP.

1. New members may join at any time, on being proposed and seconded, and elected by ballot at any monthly meeting.

2. The subscription is \$4.00 a year, payable in advance on

1st. of January.

3. Members joining during the second, third and fourth quarters of the year will only pay \$3.00, \$2.00 and \$1.00 respectively, for the period between their joining and the 31st. of December in the same year.

The \$4.00 subscription will cover all members of the same family living under the same roof.

5. Members 12 months in arrears are struck off.

6. Each subscription of \$4.00 gives the right to have out at any one time, two Volumes of new, or four of old, books; or one new and two old together. New books can be kept out a fortnight, old ones a month. New books are those which have been less than a year in the Library. Old books are all others.

7. Books lost, damaged, or not returned will be charged for at a full value as if new. Where one volume of a complete set

is lost, the whole set must be completed again.

8. No book will be issued unless signed for by a member on an issue slip.

The Library now contains 25,000 volumes; and in future there will be several hundreds of accessions every year.

The Reading Room accommodation will be doubled this year, by connecting the present Library and the next room by an open arch. Both rooms will be entirely re-furnished and re-arranged.

It may be confidently stated that the Society is now in a better position than it has been for many years; except as regards membership. This satisfactory state of affairs is entirely due to the devoted energies of former Presidents and those who acted under them, and to the enlightened generosity of our three great benefactors, Dr. James Douglas, Morrin College and the late Mrs. Turnbull. We are glad of this opportunity of showing our appreciation of these great services, without which the Society would probably have ceased to exist. For on several occasoins in recent years the members' subscriptions paid in did not suffice for current expenses; and the dangers of debt were only averted by special donations from a few of our members. To place our affairs on a more permanent basis, an Endowment Fund was started. It met with a generous response from a few individuals, and has now reached \$3,000.00, with \$500.00 more promised when the total shall have amounted to \$5,000.00.

But it is only within the present year that the Society has been set upon a sound financial footing by the three well-considered benefactions just referred to. Our Honorary President Dr. Douglas, has promised us one annuity of \$500.00, and the Governors of Morrin College another of \$250.00. Their conditions are that we shall spend \$250.00 a year on publishing MSS and other transactions, and \$500.00 on the purchase of new books. The third benefaction consists of an unconditional legacy from the late Mrs. Turnbull, whose \$5,000.00 will be added to the capital of the Endowment Fund, the interest of which is available for general purposes.

Our income will, therefore, soon amount to over \$1,500.00; though our present members' subscriptions hardly exceed a third of that sum. But this is not our only advantage. For Morrin College will renovate our premises and grant them to us in future entirely rent free; which will be equivalent to \$250.00 more per annum. And the market value of all the donations and

exchanges we now receive free comes to quite \$1,000.00. Thus, with a subscription list of only \$500., we already enjoy the equivalent of an income of over \$2,500.00. That is to say, each New Member joining now will give \$4.00 a year and receive the value of over \$20.00 back again. Indeed, he will really get more. Because, as our present income will soon suffice for running expenses, each extra \$4.00 can be applied to increasing our advantages. So that New Members will not only get back a five-fold return, but also the special extra value of their own subscriptions as well.

This is a plain unvarnished tale which must appeal directly

to anyone with a taste for what we have to offer.

But it is an appeal to self-interest alone. And we can also appeal to the reading public of Quebec on higher grounds than those of self-interest, no matter how enlightened. For we are the senior Society in the whole of Canada; with a past which has won us a welcome acceptance in the kindred World at large; and with a future which might now be made certain of still better things to come. Our advantages are many; our needs but one—and that need is New Members. And so we ask our nonsubscribing friends to join us in changing a state of things which is rather a reproach to Quebec than a defect in our Society itself. We are sure that these friends must be quite as jealous of the reputation of the place they live in as we can be ourselves. we are equally sure that none of them would like to hear how often intelligent visitors to our Library have expressed a polite surprise that even our former intellectual attractions could only draw so very few subscribers together, from the whole educated public of this world-renowned City of Quebec.

V. NOTES ON BOOK-BUYING.

Thanks to the generosity of Dr. Douglas and Morrin College, the Book-Committee will now have \$500.00 at their disposal every year; and, in order to lay this out to the best advantage, by making their selection as representative as possible, they propose to divide the money, in the following proportions, among these three different classes of books:—

CLASS A—WORKS OF REFERENCE.....\$100.00

Including Dictionaries, Cyclopædias, Atlases, Works like the Cambridge Modern History, all Annual Publications, &c., &c.

CLASS B-WORKS OF GENERAL POPULARITY \$200.00

Novels, Travels, Memoirs, and other Books chosen for their popularity with the General Reader.

CLASS C-WORKS OF SPECIAL INTEREST....\$200.00

Chosen rather for their intrinsic value than for their popularity.

These three classes are not supposed to be defined with anything approaching to scientific accuracy, nor to be mutually exclusive, nor to be intended for different kinds of readers. Some Books might well be placed in more than one class; and all three classes may appeal to different needs and moods of the same reader. The general idea is simply to keep a fairly even balance between all the various books which form desirable additions to the Library.

Class A and Class B present comparatively little difficulty; though members are particularly requested to make their wishes known by means of the Recommendation Book, which is always lying open in the Library. The Committee would be much obliged if members would kindly enter TITLE, AUTHOR, PUBLISHER and PRICE, when making recommendations.

This is only a matter of a minute or two when entering a few individual books; but it is quite a different thing when the Committee have to hunt through endless catalogues, as well as weigh the pros and cons in every one of many hundreds of cases before

making up a new list.

Class C is much harder to deal with than either A or B. The Committee will spend about half the allotment on their own initiative. But they propose to print a list of suggestions suitable for this class, with each Bulletin. These suggestions will cover three kinds of books which appeal to such special tastes that the Committee do not feel justified in making a final choice without some definite expression of opinion from other members in each individual case.

(1) All works that are usually stigmatized as "dry" or "deep", (2) All Poetry and (3) All books in foreign languages. A fourth kind might include (4) Works publised several years ago, but of enough real value to be independent of their mere "upto-dateness".

The first list of suggestions will be found under Section VII of the present Bulletin. Members are requested to enter any books they think most desirable in the Recommendation Book. Of course, the list given is only a tentative one, consisting of mere stray hints; and the Committee will always welcome any other suitable suggestions.
